





Paper 1 Question Examples...

Question 1

- Read again the xxxx part of the source, **lines** xxxxxxxx.
- List **four** things from this part of the source about xxxxxxxx.
- **[4 marks]**

Question 2

- **How does the writer use language here to xxxxxxxxxxx?**

You could include the writer's choice of:

- words and phrases
- language features and techniques
- sentence forms.

- [8 marks]

Question 3

- You now need to think about the **whole** of the **source**.
- This text is from the xxxxxxxxxxx of a novel.
- **How has the writer structured the text to interest you as a reader?**

You could write about:

- what the writer focuses your attention on at the beginning
- how and why the writer changes this focus as the source develops
- any other structural features that interest you.

- **[8 marks]**

Question 4

- Focus this part of your answer on the second part of the source, **from line xxxxxx to xxxxxx.**
- **A student, having read this section of the text, said:**
“xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx.”
- **To what extent do you agree?**

In your response, you could:

- consider your own impressions of xxxxxxxx
- evaluate how the writerxxxxxxxxxxxxxx
- support your opinions with quotations from the text.

Paper 2 Example Questions...

Question 1

- **Read again the first part of Source A from lines xxxxxxxx. Choose four statements below which are true.**
- Shade the circles in the boxes of the ones that you think are true.
- Choose a maximum of four statements.
- **4 marks]**

Question 2

- You need to refer to Source A and Source B for this question. The ways xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx is different.
- **Use details from both sources to write a summary of the different xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx.**
- **[8 marks]**

Question 3

- **You now need to refer only to xxx. How does the writer use language toxxxxxxxx?**
- [12 marks]

Question 4

- For this question, you need to refer to the whole of Source A, together with the whole of Source B.
- **Compare how the writers convey their different perspectives and feelings about xxxxxxxxxxxxxxx.**

In your answer, you could:

- compare their different perspectives and feelings
- compare the methods the writers use to convey their different perspectives and feelings
- support your response with references to both texts.
- [16 marks]
